

CARAVAN DUE HERE TUESDAY

*Tourists from Coolidge Home
Town to be Welcomed*

*Will Visit Forty-five Cities in
California on Trip*

*Continent Traversed by Party
Boosting the President*

The Coolidge-Dawes Plymouth caravan, an automobile touring party from the home town of the President, will arrive in Los Angeles next Tuesday after a 3000-mile cross-country trip over the Lincoln Highway. The caravan will enter the State at Truckee, where it will be welcomed by officials of the State campaign for Coolidge.

The first stop will be made at Sacramento, and the caravan will then proceed to Los Angeles by way of the San Joaquin Valley, where stops will be made at the principal towns. Before entering Los Angeles, the caravan will also visit a number of towns in the San Fernando Valley.

The caravan left Plymouth September 9, and during the first half of the journey covered ten States, with more than 200 stops in cities on the route of the Lincoln Highway. The California itinerary will include about forty-five cities, where addresses will be made by members of the party. From Los Angeles the caravan will go to San Francisco by way of the Coast highway, and will then proceed to Oregon and Washington.

A. W. Jefferis of Omaha, former member of Congress from Nebraska, is in charge of the caravan. Accompanying him are M. W. Pitt of Iowa, and Herbert Moore, a boyhood friend of the President.
